

# ILCHF has a single vision: that every child in Illinois grows up healthy.

Working through grantee partners across the state, the Foundation focuses its grant making on identifying and funding solutions to the barriers that prevent children from accessing the ongoing health care they need, with a primary focus on children's oral health and children's mental health.

#### DEAR FRIENDS,

Welcome to our 2020 Annual Report – our opportunity to recognize with profound gratitude the remarkable work of our 2020 grantee partners. In 2020, teams at 87 inspiring organizations were awarded just under \$13 million in grants which are supporting initiatives that improve the health and wellness of children and families in Illinois.

2020 was a year like no other, bringing heartache and challenges to us all, as the COVID-19 pandemic and the broad unveiling of the intolerable impacts of structural racism upended all that we hold dear. Like so many foundations, ILCHF spent 2020 responding to the needs both exacerbated by and created by COVID-19. In April 2020 our Board of Directors reacted swiftly to the pandemic by authorizing \$5 million in emergency COVID-19 response funding in addition to our usual annual grantmaking of about \$5.5 million per year.

After hearing from our statewide partners that childcare services and resources were an immediate need, particularly for the families of healthcare providers, ILCHF's first COVID-19 grant was to the Illinois Critical Access Hospital Network (ICAHN) to support childcare for essential hospital workers in rural hospitals across Illinois. The pandemic, and resulting statewide shutdown, caused a dramatic increase in hunger among Illinois children and families while significantly increasing demands upon the eight Illinois serving foodbanks. ILCHF responded with two rounds of funding to the foodbanks totalling \$1.5 million. These funds were used to provide meals to children and families impacted by school and after school program closings and record levels of unemployment.

Next, we heard from grantee partners that their greatest need was for general operating funds which they could use to keep their doors open and their teams employed and available to provide services to children and families as they figured out how to continue to provide services in a pandemic. In response ILCHF made its first general operating grants. First, ILCHF provided 22 Federally Qualified Health Centers (FQHC's) in Illinois over \$1 million in total to support general operating costs for services for children and families through the "FQHC COVID-19 Response" initiative. Funds were provided to address the loss of revenue associated with the move from the provision of a full spectrum healthcare to focused COVID-19 response efforts. This initiative was in partnership with Delta Dental of Illinois Foundation who provided an additional \$1 million in total to 20 additional FQHC's.

Next, seeking to support and maintain children's mental health services, ILCHF provided general operating grants to 23 Screening Assessment and Stabilization Services (SASS) community mental health providers totaling \$2.5 million. These grant funds were used to maintain SASS staff positions during the early stage of the pandemic when referral rates for crisis services declined drastically, and fee-for-service funding was insufficient to sustain the programs.

As the pandemic progressed and we moved towards reopening some services, 19 oral health providers across the state received grants totalling over \$1.5 million through the "COVID-19 Oral Health Capacity Building" initiative. Grant funds were provided to offset the additional costs associated with re-opening children's oral health programs and addressing the increased need for safety procedures and the gaps associated with lost revenue resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic. ILCHF was grateful to again partner with Delta Dental of Illinois Foundation who provided over \$1.5 million in total to an additional 17 oral health providers.

Finally, ILCHF continued funding efforts to strengthen a system of care approach to children's mental health in Illinois. Building upon two successful cycles of our Children's Mental Health Initiatives (CMHI 1.0 and CMHI 2.0), ILCHF made a new round of grants, CMHI 3.0, to five grantees of nearly \$4.25 million dollars over four years to improve children's mental health in their communities.

Our grantee partners and the communities they will serve are as follows:

- Rush University Medical Center West Side of Chicago
- Rosecrance, Inc. Winnebago & Boone Counties
- Methodist Medical Center of Illinois-Unity Point-Peoria, Tazewell & Woodford Counties
- Bridgeway Knox, Warren & Henderson Counties
- Chestnut Health System St. Clair County

In order to learn from the experiences of these communities, ILCHF awarded a grant to the University of Illinois Urbana-Champaign Children & Family Research Center to evaluate the CMHI 3.0 projects. We look forward to sharing what these providers and their community members will teach us about this work.

As 2020 came to a close, the Board of Directors authorized additional COVID-19 Response funds of \$7.5 million in 2021 and 2022 over and above our usual annual grantmaking. We have spent 2021 listening to grantee partners and other stakeholders across the state in order to understand how best to support those working to improve the health of Illinois' children and families. Our 2021 annual report will detail the award of just over \$13.5 million in grant funds over two years in support of children's oral health, and mental health, and to address food insecurity. The remaining \$1.5 million in COVID-19 Response funds will be awarded in 2022.

Like many of you, in 2020 we shared in the profound grief caused by the senseless murders of Ahmaud Arbery, George Floyd, and the countless others who lost their lives, and we emphatically supported the national outcry for racial justice catalysed by their deaths. We know that a meaningful response requires deep learning and sustainable action. To deepen our internal learning, our initial steps were to (1) create the Health Equity and Social Justice Work Group to lead the Foundation's equity, diversity and inclusion work, (2) to issue an Equity, Diversity and Inclusion (EDI) RFP, in order to partner with experts in the field who will help the Foundation identify and implement best practices to embed the concepts of equity, diversity and inclusion in our daily work, and (3) to commit \$2 million in 2021 grant making to initiatives in communities disparately impacted by systemic racism and COVID-19.

As a further preview to our 2021 annual report, this year we partnered with CommonHealth Action (CHA), a Washington DC-based consultancy which for nearly two decades has developed people and organizations to improve people's health through equitable policies, programs, and practices. This year our Board of Directors and staff participated in an organizational EDI assessment, completed CHA's EDI curriculum and at our December Board meeting adopted our EDI Action Plan. Through this work we will continue learning, planning and acting with a diverse range of stakeholders to ensure that we have a deeper understanding of the needs and opportunities to create a lasting impact. As we implement our EDI Action Plan over the next two years, we know that our approach to our work will change. We look forward to learning from you how we can be a better partner and collaborator as we work to fulfil our vision that every child in Illinois grows up healthy.

As we anticipate our next steps on this long and winding road, we welcome feedback, input and ideas from our grantee partners, collaborators, and stakeholders on how to maximize our impact within marginalized communities in Illinois. And while we know the journey forward is filled with challenges and diversions, we are heartened by the unwavering commitment of our partners across the state who are working diligently to make sure that the children of Illinois have the support and services they need to live healthy lives. We are also inspired by people of all walks of life who have banded together in order to champion greater equity, justice, access and parity across the board. This inspiration serves to renew our commitment to push the boundaries of what we previously thought was possible. We thank you for your continued partnership over the years. We look forward to a healthier future together.
