DEAR FRIENDS,

Welcome to our 2021* Annual report-our opportunity to recognize with profound gratitude the remarkable work of our 2021 grantee partners. These organizations are staffed by people who are, as Amanda Gorman writes, *"brave enough to be it"-* brave enough to be the lights that warm the hearts of those they serve and inspire those who support their work. In 2021, teams at 80 organizations across the State were awarded just over \$16 million in grants supporting initiatives that improve the health and well-being of children and families in Illinois.

Though the year started in the midst of struggle, our commitment to positively impact the lives of children and families flourished in the midst of *HOPE!* This hope was grounded in the Board of Directors' \$15 million commitment in COVID-19 Response funds for 2021 and 2022. These funds, in addition to ILCHF's usual annual grant making of approximately \$5.5 million, intended to address needs both caused and exacerbated by the pandemic.

Inspired by our Board of Directors' commitment and motivated by community voices across the State of Illinois, ILCHF and community partners responded with strategic initiatives that invested in children's oral health services, school-based mental health services, and access to healthy food, while maintaining our commitment to center equity, diversity, and inclusion in our work.

At the onset of the pandemic, the State's oral health safety net system experienced many challenges such as dental clinic closures for several months, lengthened appointment times, reduced capacity and resources, and revenue shortfalls. In response to these challenges, ILCHF partnered with Delta Dental of Illinois Foundation (DDILF) to co-fund the \$3 million *"2020 Covid-19 Oral Health Capacity Building Initiative"* which provided grants to 36 children's oral health providers supporting COVID-19 renovations and other general operating needs related to children's oral health services.

As the pandemic continued into 2021, ILCHF and DDILF continued our partnership through the *COVID-19 Response Oral Health Capacity Building Renewal Initiative* which provided just over \$3.7 million in funding to 35 public health dental clinics in Illinois. These funds were provided as general operating grants supporting each grantee's pediatric oral health programs, services, and recovery needs.

Though we continued to encounter COVID-19 related challenges, we believed in the shared sense of hope that recovery was on the horizon. This shared sense of hope energized ILCHF's long standing commitment to children's mental health and affirmed the need to increase access to children's mental health services through the lens of equity, diversity, and inclusion. In 2020, the Board of Directors committed \$2 million of ILCHF's COVID-19 funding toward investments in communities negatively impacted by COVID-19 and structural racism. In 2021, ILCHF's *COVID-19 School Well-ness Initiative – Chicago (CSWI-Chicago)* and State of Illinois (*CSWI-Illinois*) made that commitment even more impactful by increasing ILCHF's funding from \$2 million to \$4.2 million and extending ILCHF's long-time focus to improve children's mental health.

Through the Covid-19 School Wellness Initiative, partnerships comprised of one or more schools and a community mental health provider, were awarded two-year grants of up to \$300,000 to support mental health prevention, early intervention, and treatment needs of children, parents/caregivers, and school personnel. In total, ILCHF invested just over \$8.3 million in these 28 projects and an additional \$240,000 in an evaluation plan. We are hopeful these grants will be the light for those participating in these programs supporting the overall health and well-being of children and families.

The pandemic not only created a dramatic increase in the number of Illinois children and families experiencing hunger but also complicated the work of foodbanks due to a decrease in the number of volunteers to pack and distribute food, and increased packing and transportation costs. In response to community needs across the State, ILCHF deepened its long-standing partnership with Illinois' foodbanks and awarded two-year grants totaling \$250,000 to each of the eight food banks serving Illinois for a total investment of \$2 million.

"Grant funding through the ILCHF has allowed us to increase the amount of healthy foods we can provide to school districts and after-school programs. Through this grant, the Food Bank has been able to procure pre-packaged boxes and fresh milk, protein, and produce in seven additional counties, totaling over 160,000 lbs. of healthy food for students and their families."

CENTRAL ILLINOIS FOOD BANK

In 2020, ILCHF made a commitment to champion greater health equity, social justice, and parity across the State. In 2021, this commitment resulted in (1) a Health Equity and Social Justice Work Group that is informing and overseeing our Equity, Diversity, and Inclusion (EDI) journey; (2) a year-long partnership with CommonHealth Action (CHA) resulting in Board and staff participation in an organizational EDI assessment, the completion of CHA's EDI curriculum and the December 2021 adoption of ILCHF's



EDI Action Plan and (3) the investment of nearly \$4.2 million in mental health grants in 14 Chicago neighborhoods negatively impacted by both COVID-19 and structural racism.

Over the next two years we will continue our journey of learning, reflection, and action. Our overall intention is not only to embed principles of EDI into our policies, programs, and practices, but to further evolve our work to be a better Foundation, a better partner, and to create a healthier future for every child in Illinois.

As we close out 2022, we remain committed to HOPE - for there is always light. While we know the opportunities presented will be accompanied by challenges, we are encouraged by the relentlessness of our community partners who work diligently to make sure that the children of Illinois have the support

and services they need to live healthy lives. We are also inspired by people of all walks of life who have banded together and who are brave enough to envision greater equity, justice, access, and parity across the board. This inspiration serves to renew our commitment to push the boundaries of what we previously thought was possible. We thank you for your continued bravery to be the light for our communities and are privileged to partner toward efforts positively impacting the lives of Illinois children and families. We look forward to a healthier future together!
